Summary: (machine translated) Scenic, partly deeply incised canyon that impresses with its geology. The times given refer to the lower part.		
Hydrology: (machine translated) Recommended after rainfall or during rainy periods, as the river is usually free-flowing. The lower part (Developpo 1300m, escape route, forest road no. 3) is recommended. At first glance, it does not seem very interesting for canyoning. Be careful, because from a height of 503m (forest road) the current can be zero, but at the first rappel (No. 8 C.10) you will suddenly see water that can become important at C. 40, do not underestimate it.		
Access:		
Approach: (machine translated) Description for the lower part: From the lower parking lot back through the village somewhat hidden over one of the two small bridges into Franz-von-Fenner-Straße, follow this up the hill until you come to a cupboard. Park the car there and continue on foot. Follow the road further uphill until you can see DISTINCT climbing tracks on the left (after about 50 meters downhill there is a small hut, then you are in the right place). If you walk until the road is close to the stream and you can see the slide brakes, you have gone too far. Follow the path downhill and descend along the stream. (In 2024 there were some helpful rope traverses.) Once you have descended over several slide brakes, you arrive directly in the stream. Entry.		
Tour: (machine translated) Upper parts: Lower part: Quite fast parts, later even deep parts in wonderful scenic scenery with a short dark passage (no lamps necessary). Rappels and running sections of varying lengths alternate. Few technical difficulties await the canyonist, only at C40 a rope traverse has to be set up. If there is a lot of water, it can be difficult to get to the optimal position, especially on the C40.		
Return: (machine translated) Follow the stream and get out at the slide brake in the village and return to the car. Approx. 4 min
