Rappel and slide canyon with relatively long access. In the uppermost third narrow, winding and (unfortunately) totally congested.

Hydrologie:

Accès: (traduction alternative)

Better to arrive with two cars.\nEntrance parking: Coming from Admont on the Gesäuse-Bundesstraße until a road leads to Weng on the left. Follow this road over a bridge, about 500m after the bridge a forest road branches off to the right - park here.\nExit parking: Follow the Gesäuse federal road to Johnsbach station (signposted sand road).

Approche: (traduction alternative)

Follow the forest road for 3 km until you reach a small saddle with a forest road junction, here use the road descending to the left. Pass two hunting lodges to another forest road junction and keep left again. Entry at concrete bridge over the gorge that begins here.

Tour: (traduction alternative)

First third: narrow, winding and woody - many downclimbs between 5 and 20m, be careful when pulling the rope.\n\nSecond third: open valley with view to the Ödstein, much to downclimb and rappel (mostly from trees) up to 20m\n\nLast third: after a concrete step only more hiking canyon

Retour: (traduction alternative)

Along the railroad line in the direction of Johnsbach station (2km). Alternative: Follow the Ritschengraben to the Enns and let yourself drift down from there. Caution: strong sweeping water on the right side of the river at the mouth of the Bruckgraben.

However, this probably only applies to commercial providers, if at all. You could ask the nearest canyoning provider. The tour itself is not very rewarding overall. The upper part is quite nice, especially alluvial fans will get their money's worth. The lower part consists of a lot of river walking and not very interesting abseiling sections - we must have overlooked slides or misplaced them. Thanks to the mountain rescue service for setting up the rope traverse - to reach it we had to climb 10m back up over scree from the rockslide. We had great difficulty pulling off our ropes several times. The relatively tight and weathered frequent screw chain links create too much friction in conjunction with our 10mm rope. Would recommend a thinner rope. (traduction alternative)
